Interest was keen in this year's clash and speculation frantic in the light of UCD's recent resurrgence in the Senior Rowing category. Indeed they claimed there first Head of the River victory in many years at Enniskillen in March.

In the Dublin Head of the River the Trinity VIII reminded the pundits that losing last years graduates to Neptune did not spell a one-horse championship race, coming in just six seconds behind the green and black in a time of 12:39.

The London head of the River for Veterans was about to start and its latest regulations require this accourrement to be worn. Slithering himself in he murmured "In all my forty years of coxing I've never seen such nonsense." But considering the importance of the occasion he complied.

Gillett was about to steer a Veteran VIII of the London Rowing Club in the London Head of the River for Veterans. The event took on a nostalgic touch when he noticed that the bow position was filled by a Lizzie member Rob Van Mesdag who told him that last year Bill Lewis rowed in the same crew. Gillett further heard London R.C. members talk about some poor Lizzie man George Hallowes who was to have rowed in another veteran crew but was dispatched to South Africa by his engineering firm the day before.

"And where is Chris George?" Gillett wondered, knowing that George, now in his forty's, has been training with London's elite squad of 20 year olds for the past few years and still keeps up with them. But somehow London did not require his services, and Chris found refuge in a Thames R.C. crew on Saturday's Head for elite's and in an Upper Thames Veteran crew the next day.

Gillett met more Lizzie colleagues. At the finish of the course he heard the bow of a strange-looking boat from the depths of England shout at him. It was Tony Wilson rowing with Bradford R.C. Tony and Norman had not seen one another since Henley '96


